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this classroom tested volume aspires to be a brief but technically and factually accurate exposition of linguistic description and history whether studied as prime subject or as background information it should help students understand the assumptions and reasoning that underlie the contents of their handbooks and etymological dictionaries this book should be a useful guide for anyone unfamiliar with historical linguistics who is studying the history of a language and also for those who are enrolled in courses devoted to reading texts in old languages

written in a lively and accessible style the book looks at the history of german through a wide range of texts from medical legal and scientific writing to literature everyday newspapers and adverts

a linguistic history of arabic presents a reconstruction of proto arabic by the methods of historical comparative linguistics it challenges the traditional conceptualization of an old classical language evolving into the contemporary neo arabic dialects professor owens combines established comparative linguistic methodology with a careful reading of the classical arabic sources such as

the grammatical and exegetical traditions he arrives at a richer and more complex picture of early arabic language history than is current today and in doing so establishes the basis for a comprehensive linguistically based understanding of the history of arabic the arguments are set out in a concise case by case basis making it accessible to students and scholars of arabic and islamic culture as well as to those studying arabic and historical linguists

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a linguistic history of italian offers a clear and concise explanation of why modern italian grammar has become the way it is it focuses on the effects of historical changes on the modern structure of italian revealing patterns and structures which are not always apparent to those who are only familiar with modern italian although the book concentrates on the internal history of the language the emergence of italian is considered against the wider background of the history of italian dialects and other external factors such as cultural and social influences are also examined

this book describes the earliest reconstructable stages of the prehistory of english it outlines the grammar of proto indo european considers the changes by which one dialect of that prehistoric language developed into proto germanic and provides a detailed account of the grammar of proto germanic the focus throughout the book is on linguistic structure in the course of his exposition professor ringe draws on a long tradition of work on many languages including hittite sanskrit greek latin slavic gothic and old norse written to be intelligible to those with a background in modern linguistic theory the first volume in don ringe s a linguistic history of english will be of central interest to all scholars and students of comparative indo european and germanic linguistics the history of english and historical linguists the next volume in the history will consider the development of proto germanic into old english subsequent volumes will describe the attested history of english from the anglo saxon era to the present
